DECA Students Win Award for Fanwood Research Project

Several months ago DECA students at Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School took on a major market research project for the Fanwood Community Assessment Committee. The purpose of the project was to develop recommendations for the improvement of the downtown business district and of communications within the Borough.

Sophomores Andrew Elko, Jim McClintock and Tony Gicas spearheaded a survey project and developed it into a major undertaking involving much of our community. Questionnaires sent to each household in the drew an impressive response of 19%. After compiling and analyzing the survey results, the students then drafted their conclusions and recommendations, which were presented to the Assessment Committee and Borough Council.

The students then entered their project into statewide DECA competitions and won first place in the State for their Market Research - Creative Marketing project. Representing New Jersey, the students competed at the DECA National Competition in Orlando, Florida, an event that was attended by 13,000 students from throughout the United

immediately following the Memorial Day Parade. The Fanwood Memorial Library, headed by Dan Weiss, is hosting its first annual concert on Sunday May 16th at 3:30. I could go on and on but space cannot accommodate all the happenings in Fanwood, so I would like to focus on two important issues:

Many of you are aware of the Dean Oil site at the corner of 2nd Street and LaGrande Avenue. Over the years, discussion on the use of this property has ranged from retail establishments with apartments to a food market to a major retailer outlet to housing and senior citizen housing. These are only some of the uses that have been discussed but never truly realized. Now Council President Bill Populus has presented an ordinance that would provide you, the residents of Fanwood, with the opportunity to tell the Mayor and Council whether you want the borough to purchase the property and what it should be used for. Through a non-binding question on the ballot on November 2 each citizen will have the right to vote on the decision. Look for more information on this critical issue in the coming months.

Be part of Fanwood's history by participating in the Millennium clock campaign. The Fanny Wood Day Committee has raised \$15,000 towards the purchase of the clock, which will be a tribute to the working relationship between our residents, the local government and the businesses in town. As we move into the 21st Century the four-faced Victorian clock will be a monument that represents the people of Fanwood. It will be located at the corner of Martine and South Avenues and will be dedicated on our 4th Annual Fanny Wood Day Sunday September 26, 1999. Fanwood is For Family & Friends Throw A Block Party to Celebrate

Join an old Fanwood tradition by starting your own annual block party. Here's how to get started:

- Decide on the date, time and location of the party
- Write to the Fanwood Police for permission to block the street (include details on where on your street you would like traffic blocked.
- Once approved, you will be notified in writing. The Department of Public Works delivers the barricades the day before the party. If the party continues past dark, the barricades must be lit.
- Some blocks ask everyone to

chip in money for food and drinks; others ask party-goers to bring their own. Many parties donate excess money to local organizations.

- Plan plenty of activities for the kids, add music, good weather and stir.

Recycling Center Offers Citizens Magic of Mulch

Generally we bring material to the Scotch Plains-Fanwood Recycling Center. But there is a material that we can take away from the center for use in gardening or around shrubs. Its mulch! Mulch is a decomposed, natural, loose material that is used to discourage the growth of weeds and to conserve soil moisture. While wood chips at the center are available to anyone, mulch is exclusively for the use of Fanwood residents, so don't be surprised if a recycling attendant asks you for identification.

If you need mulch, bring containers and a shovel to the center between 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM on Wednesday or Saturday.

History Collection To Be Established

The Fanwood Historic Preservation Commission and the Fanwood Public Library have announced the creation of the Fanwood Collection to be located in the Fanwood Room of the Library.

The Collection will consist of photographs, maps, documents, correspondence and other historic memorabilia related to the development of Fanwood and its significance as a 20th-century suburban commuter community.

Volunteers with expertise in archiving historic collections to assist in this project are sought. Interested parties may contact the Fanwood Borough Hall.

The Fanwood Collection will also include professional reference books for in-library use on a variety of topics with an emphasis on restoring and preserving historic houses.

Several of the books are intended to help homeowners identify the styles of their houses within the context of New Jersey's diverse architectural heritage. Others will help homeowners select authentic color schemes for their houses, while still others will provide inspiration for period interior design schedules.

Technical advice for restoring, repairing, renovating and adding on to older houses is offered in several books, two of which focus on specific rooms of the house: the kitchen and the bathroom.

The Commission is working with Dan Weiss, the Fanwood Library Director, to establish a system for access to these materials by residents.

The Fanwood Historic Preservation Commission was established by ordinance of the Borough to assist the Borough in identification of historic resources, to advise Borough agencies regarding goals and techniques of historic preservation, to collect and distribute historical materials, and to establish and preserve local historic resources.

Mayor Seeks Contributions Toward Millennium Clock

Mayor Maryanne S. Connelly of Fanwood announced that contributions are still being accepted for the Millennium Clock soon to be installed at the south side of the Fanwood Train Station.

"Fanwood is a perfect community for a clock that chimes. Unlike other towns, the noise from the traffic will not overwhelm the chimes, which can be controlled so as not to interfere with normal hours of sleep," she revealed.

The Fanny Wood Day Committee has already raised \$15,000 toward the project, and major fund-raising efforts are underway.

Residents and businesses will receive a letter asking for their participation. The levels of giving will be outlined, and donors who contribute \$500 or more will receive a miniature replica of the clock and have their names inscribed on a brass plaque on the base of the town clock.

Plans are being made to dedicate the Fanwood Millennium Clock on Sunday, September 26, at the fourth annual Fanny Wood Day festivities. Contributions should be sent to Mayor Maryanne Connelly at 75 North Martine Avenue.
