With no formal training, a used ambulance and a garage shared with the fire department, the Fanwood Rescue Squad was born on April 6, 1948. The squad began with 29 charter members at a time when there was no such thing as 911, CPR or any certification other than a driver's license. By its second year, the squad answered 100 calls for assistance.

By 2008, the Fanwood Rescue Squad has answered tens of thousands of calls, now averaging 54 a month, a jump of about 25%



A Message From Mayor Colleen Mahr

Without doubt, the 2008 municipal budget has proven to be the most challenging in recent history. The situation we're experiencing has been called a "perfect storm" of municipal budget writing. In 2007 the state imposed a 4% spending cap, followed this year by a 4% cap on the tax

levy. If costs only rose by 4% and state aid remained the same, we could meet those limits.

But costs do rise faster than 4%, as each of you are painfully aware every time you gas up your car or stop for groceries at the supermarket. Borough costs for fuel and utilities have risen too, as have a myriad of other expenses we have no control over. One example is a 36% increase in Fanwood's mandated state pension payment this year. That increase alone is approximately \$200,000.

And state aid does *not* remain the same. In February we learned that Governor Corzine's proposed budget targeted all 323 small towns (populations less than 10,000) with aid reductions totaling \$37 million! Fanwood's State Municipal Aid would be drastically cut, by 17%; another \$200,000.

It is important to acknowledge that the state is waging an assault on small towns in New Jersey. The state incorrectly accuses us of being fiscally inefficient, despite substantial data to the contrary. Based on this false premise, the state is exerting financial pressure on small towns to merge.

from just five years ago. Aging baby boomers and a growing population are often cited nationally as the reasons for the increase and the numbers are still climbing.

Today, the Rescue Squad's volunteer members are the most highly trained responders in the history of emergency medical services. Mandatory training includes CPR/ defibrillation, advanced first aid, incident command management, hazardous materials awareness and, since 9/11, training for possible chemical, biological and nuclear incidents. Our EMTs receive additional intensive training and are certified by the state of NJ.

In May, we were pleased to offer free CPR training to our citizens, both to equip them for cardiac emergencies and to give them a taste of what we do. Thanks to the generous and civic minded local

Mayor's Message

The state should examine the facts closely before continuing to pursue such flawed policy. As president of the New Jersey Association of Mayors, I am working towards a change in this policy and have hopes for restoration of some state aid. I also think it is important to mention that despite state pressure and despite local scuttlebutt to the contrary, there are no discussions going on to merge the Borough with Scotch Plains.

Your municipal council introduced an \$8.4 million budget in March. All borough departments submitted operating budgets with reductions ranging from 5-10% of the 2007 budget. Flat budgets are no longer acceptable; yet we are still forced to discuss further reductions in order to minimize the tax increase.

At the same time, Fanwood is a model of how local government can benefit from Shared Service projects. We have numerous agreements in place throughout the county and with our local Board of Education, saving you real tax dollars. We are currently working on several more initiatives that will deliver the services you expect in an even more cost-effective manner.

On June 30th, when the State Legislature adopts its budget, we will finally know how much aid we will receive from the state; at that point we will also know the status of our application for Extraordinary Aid. Extraordinary Aid grants must be dedicated to reducing the local property tax burden and Fanwood has been fortunate to secure these grants for the past few years.

Unlike our colleagues in state government, your mayor and council are unpaid and receive no compensation for the work we do, yet we have held a staggering number of budget hearings, which the public is always welcome to attend. We anticipate adopting a final budget in mid-July. The council will continue to operate as fiscal conservatives with your tax dollars. With this in mind, prior to budget adoption, there will be a public hearing scheduled where residents may share their suggestions. The meeting will be advertised at the train station and on TV 35, so keep your eyes out for announcements.

Recycling Center Now Accepting CDs, DVDs and Assorted Electronics

Two new containers have been built at the Recycling Center.
The first will allow Fanwood to broaden the list of currently accepted plastics to include plastic chairs, tables, buckets, CDs, DVDs, and shopping bags. The second

container will allow recycling of various electronics such as TVs, computers, monitors, VCRs and stereo equipment.

In the past, Union County has established locations and dates on which it will recycle electronics. Now Fanwood's Recycling Center is, on a trial basis, accepting these materials. Visitors to the Center will see the special container marked with a sign which will house old computers, old TV sets, etc. This should be a major convenience to our



recycling citizens who otherwise have to travel wherever the county designates – often at an inconvenient time or at a good distance.

Our center has a history of keeping ahead of the

county and the state by designating recyclable materials to keep out of landfills. We began accepting mixed paper and books before the state put them on its "must cycle list" and we are still unique in accepting solid plastic items like pails, children's toys, and computer printer ink cartridges.

The Recycling Center is at the intersection of Westfield Road and North Avenue. It is open on Wednesdays and Saturdays from 9 am to 1 pm.

Property Tax Relief Programs

The following property tax relief programs are available to individuals who meet certain income and age requirements:

- **\$250 Senior Citizen Deduction**: 65 and older or disabled. Income cannot exceed \$10,000 (not including Social Security).
- **Property Tax Freeze aka Property Tax** Reimbursement Program: 65 and older or disabled. To qualify, 2007 income for a married couple cannot exceed \$55,344; single person \$45,135 (includes all sources of income).
- **\$250 Veteran Deduction**: Available to any veteran who has been honorably discharged from the Armed Services of the United States and served during active war and certain peace-keeping missions.

For more information or to obtain an application for the above programs, contact the Office of the Tax Collector (908) 322-8236 Extension 126.

Homestead Rebate: The State of New Jersey will be mailing applications during the month of May. According to the State, homeowners with gross income of \$150,000 or less will qualify for a rebate this year. For residents with an income of less than \$100,000 the rebate will be 20% of the first \$10,000 paid in property taxes. Homeowners with gross income between \$100,001 and \$150,000 will receive rebates of 10% of the first \$10,000 (instead of the 15% that was received last year).

Under the Homestead Rebate program, seniors and disabled persons will receive the greater of a percentage of their property taxes or an amount calculated under last year's alternate rules which provide rebates ranging from \$500 to \$1,200 depending on income and taxes paid.



Senior Sidelights - Handyman Program

The Borough of Fanwood is applying for a grant from Union County for a Senior Citizen Handyman Program.
