This year the Carriage House Poetry Series (founded and directed by Adele Kenny) celebrates its 10th anniversary, and was honored in April with resolutions presented by State Assemblywoman Linda Stender and Fanwood Mayor Colleen Mahr. The project initiative was funded by the NJ State Arts Council, Department of State, through a grant administered by the Union County Division of Cultural & Heritage Affairs.



A Message From Mayor Colleen Mahr

Let me update you on the 2008 Municipal Budget. In March, your Municipal Council introduced an \$8.4 million budget. All departments submitted operating budgets with reductions ranging from 5-10% from 2007. Flat budgets were unacceptable. We are discussing further reductions to minimize tax increases.

Your Mayor and Borough Council have heard the pleas of the taxpayers. We know you expect this governing body to be leaders, take a stand and make the tough decisions in reducing the 2008 municipal budget.

After months of meetings, I am pleased to share with you a budget that presents a \$600,000 decrease over the introduced budget. This will mean an approximate 10% decrease in your 4th quarter tax bill; approximately \$200 per household. This decrease shows the commitment of the majority of your governing body to reducing the tax burden even as we face cuts in state aid and increased mandated obligations. With the reductions taken at the municipal level, your overall tax bill, which includes the county and board of education, will reflect a 5.6% total increase over 2007.

In June the focus shifted to a reduction of work force after operating expenses were reduced. Please understand that this was not an easy conversation, but a necessary dialogue. Actions to reduce the enormous tax burden on residents had to be taken. The ultimate decision was that across-the-board personnel cuts would be made. As you may be aware, there has been a lot of speculation regarding how this will affect the police department. The police department effective October 1st will now operate at a 20-man force versus a 21-man force. I have been personally assured by Police Chief Domanoski that public safety would NOT be compromised with this one man reduction. At no time have the Mayor and Council considered taking any action that would risk the safety and well-being of our residents and business community.

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In 1999, the Fanwood Arts Council (originally called the Fanwood Cultural Arts Committee) was founded as a special mayor's committee. In June 2005, the name of the committee was changed by Mayor Mahr to Fanwood Arts Council, and Tom Plante was appointed Co-Director. Since its establishment, the Fanwood Arts Council has presented over 75 events, including poetry readings, multi-cultural and multi-disciplinary arts festivals, dance recitals, vocal and instrumental performances, art shows, and "Bandstand Concerts." Funding has come from HEART grants, Merck & Co., the Scotch Plains/Fanwood Service League, the Fanwood Recycling Association, the Fanwood Borough Council, and local merchants. The Carriage House Series is currently a satellite project of the Arts Council and has featured dozens of distinguished poets, including a Pulitzer Prize winner, a National Book Award Winner, a Chancellor of the Academy of American Poets, NJ State Arts Council Fellowship recipients, Dodge Foundation Poets, and winners of various

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Councilman Bruce Walsh Leaves Office After 12 Years

In 1988 I was first elected to the Fanwood Council and served a three-year term from 1988 through 1991. I was given a year off in 1992, and then was elected and served two terms from 1993 through 1998. I am currently in the third year of my last term (probably) as a Councilman in Fanwood, and at the end of this year, I will have served a total of 12 years on the Fanwood Council. During those years, at various times, I have been Council President, Police Commissioner, Fire Commissioner and liaison to the Planning Board. I also served on committees such as Board of Health, Shade Tree, Library, Historic Preservation and Public Safety. In between terms on the council I was appointed to the Planning Board, and was a pro-bono attorney for the group opposing the “monopole” cellular tower once proposed for Fanwood.

In the last twenty years I suppose I have attended well over 1,000 meetings on matters related to Fanwood, and met hundreds of volunteers working for this wonderful Borough. I have had the pleasure and privilege of getting to know the dedicated people who work for Fanwood, beginning with our Borough Administrator Eleanor McGovern, and including our Police Chiefs and Officers, our Borough Office Personnel and the men in our Public Works Department. I have a special admiration

for all the volunteers I have met, from the members of our volunteer Fire and Rescue Squads to all those who serve on our various Boards and Committees. These are the people who get little public recognition but who deserve the gratitude of all of us who love Fanwood.

Blue Star Family Update

From our last issue, we want to provide some updates on the Fanwoodians who are currently serving our country in various branches of the U.S. military. The Borough of Fanwood continues to honor and recognize their service to protect our country, and the sacrifices their families have made. Inside the main entrance area of Borough Hall is a listing of Fanwoodians currently serving in the military. Updates in alphabetical order are:

Lt. Huckelberry Finne, 29, of Farley Avenue, is serving in the U.S. Navy. He is a lifelong resident of Fanwood, attended School One, Park Middle School and SPF High School. He is a 2001 graduate of Rutgers University. He served three years aboard the USS Charlotte, a fast attack nuclear submarine home ported at Pearl Harbor, HI. He ended his service on the USS Charlotte with a voyage to the North Pole when the sub sailed from the Pacific to the Atlantic. Until recently he was a Navy ROTC instructor at SUNY Maritime College in NYC. He is beginning a six-month tour of duty in Kandahar, Afghanistan.

Jeff Peterson, 33, is still serving in Europe in the Army Reserves, in a military police unit on his second deployment overseas. Jeff is also a member of our Borough's Department of Public Works.

Staff Sgt. Frank Schwartzberg, 34, of Madison Avenue, is serving in the U.S. Army. He is a lifelong resident of Fanwood, attended School One, Park Middle School and SPF High School. He just finished a tour in Iraq and is returning to his home base at Ft. Sill in Lawton, Oklahoma. He has also served in Germany and South Korea, including service near the border of North Korea.

Driver and Pedestrian Safety Tips

Driver Safety Tips

- You can encounter pedestrians anytime and anywhere – even in places where they are not supposed to be found.
- Do not overtake and pass other vehicles stopped for pedestrians.
- When you are turning, you often have to wait for a “gap” in traffic. Beware that while you are watching for that “gap,” pedestrians may have moved into your intended path.
- Be especially attentive around schools and in neighborhoods where children are active.
- Stay focused and alert for pedestrians.
- Stop for a pedestrian in a crosswalk, when the pedestrian is approaching from the opposite half of the roadway and is close enough to be in danger.
- Stop for a pedestrian in a crosswalk while executing a right or left turn and the pedestrian is in the half of the roadway that your vehicle is entering.
- Look out for the pedestrians that may be hidden from view by other vehicles that have stopped.
- Be extra vigilant for pedestrians when driving at dawn or dusk.
- Anticipate the difficulties of the elderly or young children who are crossing the street.
- Obey all traffic laws and pay attention to traffic control signals and posted signs.

Pedestrian Safety Tips

- Always cross within marked crosswalks or at street corners
- Look left, right, then left again for vehicular traffic before stepping onto roadway.
- Yield to any approaching vehicles while crossing even if you have the right of way. Oncoming vehicles may reach you faster than you anticipate.
- Make eye contact with drivers to ensure that they see you.
- Keep to the right of the crosswalk, and be patient and alert when crossing the street.
- Obey all traffic signals and use the pedestrian signal buttons at intersections.
- Cross the street only when the “Walk” light is on. Do not begin crossing if the “Don’t Walk” or raised hand is flashing steadily.
- Be especially careful of vehicles that may turn right on red or turn left at an intersection. Drivers may be busy looking out for the other vehicles instead of pedestrians.
- If buses or other large vehicles are blocking your view, wait for them to pass before crossing. These vehicles may also be busy looking out for other vehicles instead of pedestrians.
- Do not walk behind a vehicle that has its reverse lights on.
- Walk on the sidewalk. If there is no sidewalk, walk on the left side of the roadway so you can see oncoming traffic.
- Stand at least ten feet away from the curb while waiting at bus stops.
- Do not allow your children to walk near roadways or cross the street unsupervised. Parents should accompany their young children until they are sure that their children can cross the street safely.
- Do not try to cross mid-block or between parked cars.
- Make it easy for drivers at night to see you. **Dress in light colors and wear retro-reflective material. If possible, attach a piece of reflective material to your clothing or handbag.**
- Carry a flashlight when it is dark.

English Ivy

- English ivy is a non-native plant species – an alien plant that does not naturally grow in a particular area.
- Originally brought overseas from Europe during colonial times
- A monoculture – once this plant is grown, it will completely take over & not allow other plants species to grow.
- Invasive – if planted and not kept in check, it will continue to spread out to other areas (parks, woodlands and neighboring sites).
- If allowed to climb up a tree, its vines will eventually “suffocate” and kill the tree.

Ivy Removal Is Easy!

1. The Fanwood Environmental Commission and the Shade Tree Commission recommend the removal of English ivy from trees.
2. Wear gloves, a long sleeve shirt and long pants
3. Tools: Pruning shears, clippers, prying tool or large screwdriver
4. Sever all vines about 3 ft. up the tree starting from the ground closest to the bottom of the tree trunk; do this around the entire circumference of the tree trunk.
5. Pull severed vines off the tree.
6. Remaining vines on the upper part of the tree will eventually dry up, fall off, and decompose.
7. Pull out all vines from the ground at least 6 ft. away from the tree trunk’s circumference.
8. Discard or allow cut vines to dry and then compost them; **DO NOT** place any vines on soil; it will re-grow.
9. Monitor the site for any signs of re-growth.

Fanwood Museum

On Sunday, October 5th, the Fanwood Museum, located in the Community House (on the north side of the train station), will be open from 2 - 4 PM. Long time residents Jacqueline Cecchettini, June McCarthy and Earl Phillips will share their memories of life in Fanwood over the past several decades including the 1930s and 40s. In 1995, to mark the borough’s centennial, Ms. Cecchettini compiled *Fanwood - The Way It Was - The Way We Were*, random recollections of Fanwood.

The museum houses a variety of artifacts chronicling the history of Fanwood. Brochures are available at Fanwood Borough Hall and other locations around town. For more information, call Borough Hall at (908) 322-8236.

Their concerns were taken into account and did not fall on deaf ears.


The Borough was fortunate to receive \$425,000 in extraordinary aid from the State that will go directly to reducing taxes. On behalf of us all I would like to convey my appreciation to Assemblywoman Linda Stender for her assistance in securing this aid for the Borough. We are lucky to have such a strong advocate. Without her help I doubt we would have been as successful in petitioning for aid from the state.

The governing body expects to adopt a final budget in August. Please understand that I hear your wish for budget cuts. Although we control only 20% of the tax bill, I will continue to make the difficult decisions on the portion of the budget we do control.

Finally, with the return to school, I recommend that you read the tips on pedestrian and driver safety that you will find on page 5, and be aware of those sharing the road with you. The Fall promises several local events including Fanny Wood Day on September 21st. I look forward to seeing all of you there. Did You Know...

Sheelen's Crossing



Sheelen's Crossing, or Central Crossing as it had been called, was originally a wooden truss bridge that provided passage over the railroad tracks between North and South Avenues.

In 1966, it was replaced by a modern concrete structure at a price of \$123,000.00.

The bridge was dedicated in January, 1995 by the mayor at the time, Linda Stender, and was named after one of Fanwood's pioneer families, the Sheelens. The Sheelen Brothers' store stood on South Ave., just over the bridge, and served as Fanwood's first grocer and butcher shop in the late 1800's. A descendant of the Sheelen family, Charles J. Sheelen, Jr., was an active and dedicated member of the community. He joined the Fanwood Fire Company in 1930, where he served in various capacities for over 60 years. He also was a charter member of the Fanwood Rescue Squad and presided over the Board of Health.

Pledge to Make a Difference, One Light at a Time

Be part of Fanwood's commitment to save energy and our environment.

In March 2008, the Mayor and Town Council of Fanwood agreed to promote the "Change a Light, Change the World Program" sponsored by the Office of Clean Energy of New Jersey Board of Public Utilities (BPU). The resolution specifies "soliciting a minimum of 200 residents and/or businesses to sign the CHANGE-A-LIGHT PLEDGE to switch to compact fluorescent light bulbs (CFLs) for the five most commonly used lights in their homes or businesses."

The Fanwood Environmental Commission has also taken up the challenge to help preserve our country's energy resources and join Americans nationwide in the fight against global warming. The Commission encourages Fanwoodians, by September 30th, 2008, to change at least one light at home to one that has earned the government's ENERGY STAR for energy efficiency.

To give you a sense of the impact that small actions can have on our energy resources and the environment, if every American home replaced just one light bulb or fixture with an ENERGY STAR label, each year we would save more than \$600 million in energy costs, enough energy to light more than 3 million homes, and prevent greenhouse gases equivalent to the emissions of more than 800,000 cars!

Please join us now in taking the pledge. It's a simple commitment that will go a long way to assure that the energy resources we rely on and the environment we live in are preserved for generations to come. Recycling Association Makes Donations

With many thanks for strong community support, the Fanwood-Scotch Plains Recycling Association announces its spring 2008 donations. They are as follows:

- \$1,050 to the Fanwood Rescue Squad for two children's pedi boards and pagers for two new members
- \$3,000 to the Recreation Commission for an inflatable movie screen on which to show summertime movies
- \$425 to the Fanwood Library for a door counter and display acrylic
- \$525 to the Volunteer Fire Department for replacement of worn saws
- \$4,600 to the Department of Public Works for a truck-mounted calcium chloride tank to spread salt on snowy Borough streets

As usual the grants are in line with Association policy favoring municipal departments and/or committees that will return something to the town as a whole.
