

Did You Know?

Commuters returning to Fanwood each evening may briefly notice the beautiful building they are hurrying past, but may not be aware of its historical significance. Celebrating its 135th birthday this year, the Fanwood Train Station building is the oldest remaining railroad station in Union County.

Similar buildings once graced stations at Perth Amboy, Dunellen, Glen Gardner, Bound Brook, Matawan, Elizabeth and Clinton Avenue in Plainfield; only Fanwood's survives. Noted for its illustrious Victorian Gothic architecture, the building is on both the state and federal registry of historic buildings.



Taken in 1874, this photo shows the railroad after it had completed the change in its course from its original Midway Avenue location to its present locale. There is no reliable information as to why the station was built on the westbound side of the tracks rather than the New York City bound side.

For many years, the lower level was used for ticket selling, telegraph services, record keeping and a waiting room. The upper level sometimes served as a residence for the station agent and his family. In 1964, the building was retired from rail service and donated to Fanwood. Later, a \$275,000 renovation was done to preserve and protect it.

The building is now home to the Fanwood Museum. Open the first Sunday of each month, except during the summer, the Museum houses a variety of artifacts chronicling the history of Fanwood.

Sign up for Emergency Notification!



Union County residents can now register their cell phone and e-mail accounts on a notification system that will send out alerts in the event of a local emergency.

The system already has the records of all land line residential phone numbers in the county, but you must add cell phone, e-mail and pager information if you want notification on those devices. Alerts are available on request for weather, traffic and special events. Residents using internet phone systems such as Skype and Vonage need to register those numbers as well. A Message From Mayor Colleen Mahr

While the lazy days of summer will soon give way to the bustle of fall I want to update you on what has been a very busy time in and around the Borough. In my January State of the Borough Address I promised that I, along with the council and administration, would take a hard look at current operations to ensure that we are delivering government services in the most cost-effective and efficient way possible.

I sit on the Fanwood Shared Services Committee with Council President Donna Dolce, Councilman David Valian and Borough Administrator Eleanor McGovern, who along with our counterparts in Scotch Plains have been meeting regularly this summer.

We've heard your concerns about high property taxes. Although borough expenses comprise only 20% of your property tax bill (with the Board of Education making up 60% and the County 20%) that 20% represents many of your tax dollars and we are serious about trimming costs where possible. To that end we are pleased to report that a full shared services study is now underway, examining all services. I expect a full report by the end of the year.

While we are looking closely at the operation of every department I want to make it clear that this is not a consolidation study; merging Scotch Plains and Fanwood is not on the table.

With the objective being the provision of quality services while trimming costs, the study aims to provide an in-depth analysis of the operations and finances of both towns, providing a reliable tool to guide our decision-making. Before the end of 2009 we plan a second community meeting so that you may review our progress and share your views.

On another note, I encourage you to register for the Union County First Alert program. The program is in place now and will call all home phones in the county in the case of a security or health emergency. You can expand that service with a visit to www.ucfirstalert.org to receive the alerts by text and/or e-mail as well. You can stick with the basic emergency alert or select additional alerts for weather, transit, special events and more.

Our summer programs have been a big success this year. Wide-ranging library programs and fantastic planning by the Recreation Commission have brought the day camp, free movies in the park and a wide array of sports programs, giving the community a lot of fun choices. We are fortunate to have many hands involved in our wonderful community and I would be remiss if I didn't say thank you to them all.

I want to take a moment and ask that we support the local business community. We have some great long-time merchants and wonderful new businesses opening along South Avenue. The new merchants made a choice to open their doors in Fanwood because of the tremendous promise they see in us as a community. In these tough economic times local merchants need us more than ever. Downtown redevelopment is coming on line – the promise of a vibrant downtown is ours and we can each share in that success by shopping locally.

Finally I want to address the recent arrests of elected officials throughout the state. I was offended and angered by the greed these individuals are reported to have exhibited. However, what upset me more was that this group could overshadow the hundreds of good, honest and ethical elected officials that get up every day with the goal of making their town the best it can be, who would never ever think of selling their public office for personal gain. Public service has always been and will continue to be an honorable pursuit and I am proud to be a part of it.

Blood Center Hosts NJ Artists

The New York Blood Center's (NYBC) new blood donation center at 2279 South Avenue in Scotch Plains will be doing a lot more than just collecting platelets from blood donors. It will serve as an art gallery, showing work from New Jersey artists. Exhibits will rotate every couple of months with the hope that the center will become a regular place to visit for area residents. In addition, the donation room will be named in honor of Fanwood resident and longtime Blood Center volunteer Bob Sommerich.

In September, the center will be open three or four days a week and will be able to accommodate approximately 100 donors a day.

To help make the golden years more golden for Fanwood's seniors, a number of programs and services are offered by Fanwood and the state of New Jersey. A short list follows including contact information and financial requirements.

1. Free Stroke Screening will be available on Monday, September 28th from 9:30 AM to 12:30 PM, by appointment only at Forest Road Park. To register, please call Paulette at the number above and leave your name and telephone number. She will contact you with an appointment time.
2. The Handyman Program is designed to help Fanwood's seniors make minor, non-emergency repairs so that they may live safely in their own homes. These repairs can include windows and screens, shelves and railings, replacement of locks and door handles, installation of fixtures, switches and smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, assistance in moving heavy objects, minor painting, electrical and plumbing. Clients pay only for the cost of materials. Income guidelines are up to \$43,050 for a single household and \$49,200 for a 2-person household. To apply, contact Paulette at the number above.
3. Senior Citizen Bus Service is available for food shopping and other limited trips but not for medical transportation. Clients must be 55 years or older, self-reliant or accompanied by an aide. For information or an application, please call Paulette or the bus service at (908) 322-5151.
4. PAAD Pharmaceutical Assistance for the aged and disabled. Single income limit: below \$24,432. Married couples limit: below \$29,956. These income guidelines also apply to Lifeline energy assistance and the HAAAD hearing aid assistance.
5. SENIOR GOLD Single income level from \$24,432 to \$34,432. Married couples income level from \$29,956 to \$39,956. For more information on this program call (800-792-9745) or visit the state website at www.state.nj.us/health/seniorbenefits

New Butterfly Garden

A new butterfly garden now greets visitors at the Fanwood Nature Center. Perry Sandrock, a SPFHS senior, chose the making of a butterfly garden as her Girl Scout gold award project. After gaining approval from the Fanwood Environmental Commission, Perry began designing the 30-ft. circular garden, which is in the shape of a peace sign. In order for the garden to become a certified monarch waystation by Monarch Watch, native plants and different types of milkweeds that would attract butterflies are being used. Perry called upon various local businesses to assist in her efforts. Donations included wood chips (Fanwood DPW), plants (*Parker Gardens*), composting materials (*Panettone's Deli*), and a truckload of mushroom soil (*Bartell's Farm & Garden Supply*). Perry hopes to officially open the garden site to the public with a guest speaker in late August/early September.



Annual Build-A-Birdhouse Contest

The Fanwood-Scotch Plains Recycling Association A Win-Win For Everyone!

The Fanwood-Scotch Plains Recycling Association is a magnificent Fanwood resource providing a variety of benefits while helping to save our planet and encouraging everyone to take pride in our community and environment.

Perhaps many residents are not aware that the Fanwood Recycling Center provides many benefits and significant cost savings to the community while supporting and encouraging community service among our young and old alike.

While other communities struggle to find ways to reduce costs or look for creative revenue sources, Fanwood has been ahead of the curve for over 25 years!

First, Fanwood residents save \$25 - \$35 in their annual tax bill that would be charged to cover the cost of a curbside pick-up program. With the rising cost of trash hauling services and increased tipping fees, the cost of curbside pick-up programs has escalated over the life of the Fanwood program.

Second, our recycling program generates revenue that is returned to the community in a variety of ways. Volunteer groups such as Girl Scout and Boy Scout troops, churches and other local civic organizations that donate their time each Saturday receive between \$200 and \$300 per weekend for their time. These funds are used by the groups to provide and support the programs of their membership.

In addition, the Recycling Association provides regular

grants to many Fanwood organizations such as equipment for our Fire and Rescue Squad, a camera for TV35 and a snow plow for the Public Works Department. Without these grants, the cost of these items would have been passed on to Fanwood residents in higher taxes.

The more recycling we collect, - materials are accepted from anyone regardless of where they live - the more we save in taxpayer dollars. That is certainly something to smile about.

Fanwood Clipper on the Move!

The *Fanwood Clipper*, has moved just a few doors up South Avenue to 224 South Avenue. Owned by Renato (Ron) Marcovecchio, the barber shop has been a fixture in Fanwood for over 39 years. Its new location is part of the site developed by Mr. Marcovecchio and his family on the corner of South Avenue and Second Street.

Shared Services Study Committee Disaster Shelter Volunteer Training

Fanwood and Scotch Plains are in the midst of a shared services study to identify possible cost savings and efficiencies for both municipalities. Funded through a New Jersey Shared Available Resources Efficiency (SHARE) grant, the municipalities have hired the consulting firm of Jersey Professional Management of Cranford, to complete much of the data collection and prepare a report.

Mayor Colleen Mahr emphasizes, "This is not a consolidation study. A consolidation study is a very different type of study. This is about department services and where we can try and save taxpayer dollars and/or increase services."

In addition to the Mayor, other members representing Fanwood are Council members Donna Dolce and David Valian and Borough Administrator/Clerk Eleanor McGovern.

On June 18th a joint Town Hall meeting was held at the Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School. Additional meetings, as well as communications at council meetings, local newspapers and the Borough website will assist residents in remaining informed as the process continues. A final report is expected to be shared with the committee by December 31st.

The Tri-County Chapter of the American Red Cross is currently seeking volunteers to be part of a nationwide database to provide support in times of disaster and to serve as Disaster Shelter Volunteers. Training is being offered throughout Union County over the next several months, and one such program is being offered in Fanwood the weekend of October 17th and 18th.

The Disaster Shelter Volunteer training consists of three 3-hour-courses, which must be taken in sequence. 
