A Special Message From Your Office of Emergency Management Team

Public safety officials spend a lot of time preparing for the worst and hoping for the best. Hurricane Sandy, the largest Atlantic storm ever recorded, brought its worst to the shores of New Jersey and New York, leaving at least 110 people dead in the United States and causing an estimated \$20 billion in damage.

In Fanwood, there were no storm-related casualties and all our homes are still

standing. However, downed trees damaged a number of homes and power was initially out for the entire town. Full power restoration not achieved for some residents until 13 days later. We may not have received the worst, but it was bad enough. Still, we prepared for it thanks to a dedicated team of paid and volunteer men and women who began planning days before the storm hit and maintained their focus on Fanwood's recovery in the days thereafter.

The emergency management

team, consisting of Emergency Management Coordinator Howard Drewes, Mayor Colleen Mahr, Police Chief Richard Trigo, Fire Chief John Piccola, Rescue Squad Captain Tom Kranz, Public Works Director Clint Dicksen, Borough Council Liaison Kathy Mitchell and Administrative Assistant Dianne Howarth, began planning for the storm on October 26th, several days before landfall was forecast, and continued meeting several times a day through

The UC First Alert Network is administered by The County of Union, Office of Emergency Management.



- email account (work, home, other)
- cell phone (via text)
- pager
- smartphone/PDA (BlackBerry, Treo & and other handhelds)

When an incident or emergency occurs, authorized senders will instantly notify you. The UC First Alert Network is your personal connection to real-time updates, instructions on where to go, what to do, or what not to do, who to contact and other important information.

Library Serves as Gateway, Magnet and Refuge

There's nothing quite like a natural disaster to draw neighbors together. And that's just what caused more than 5,000 visits to the Fanwood Memorial Library after Hurricane Sandy when the Office of Emergency

Management (OEM) decided to open a warming and charging station in the library. For a week, people came to access their mail, update friends and family about their health and home, and research the Internet for answers to insurance and flooding problems. They came to recharge their phones and laptops, to commiserate about their losses, and to celebrate their survival. Some took the opportunity to

explore hardcovers and magazines while waiting for electronic devices to recharge.

Fanwood Library Director Dan Weiss, his staff, volunteers, and student pages were more than up to the task. They manned the desk for long hours and provided technical, research, and personal support. OEM Director Howard Drewes kept on top of things, American Water donated bottled water, and the FRIENDS of the Library donated cookies.

Mayor Mahr commented, "I cannot express in words how proud I am of our community. The library staffers have kept this place open since day one of Superstorm Sandy. It's incredible. We have staff and volunteers who have left their own damaged homes to come and help serve. It is times like this that show the mettle of a community and I couldn't be more proud of Fanwoodians."

Mr. Weiss echoed that special thanks are due to all of the dedicated, hardworking library staff and some volunteers who kept things running smoothly and effectively. Library pages Kevin Fleck and Josh Axlerod and volunteers Matt Fleck and Katherine DeMarco spent long hours helping people do everything from powering

devices to getting internet access, troubleshooting computer issues and more. Extra special kudos go to staff member Nancy Kipping who, especially during the first few days following the hurricane, served long hours efficiently managing the crowds and keeping everything running smoothly. Thanks also go to Scotch Plains resident Colleen Gialanella who set up outside the library on Friday to warm residents by passing out free hot chocolate.

Many other Fanwood Borough employees also gave tirelessly in a variety of capacities throughout the crisis to make sure residents had what they needed to be safe and comfortable.

This was only the most recent evidence of what our library has become- a community center for the curious, a crossroads where neighbors recharge, research, and renew their ties to the local and global.

As the library explores ways to meet the ever-changing needs of residents, the FRIENDS of the Fanwood Library is collecting comments from residents. 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the first week after the storm hit. Other members of Borough Council joined these meetings on an ongoing basis. The team made a concerted effort to communicate with our residents in as many venues as possible--email alerts to subscribers, a reverse 911 call to all residents' home phones and First Alert text messages to UC First Alert subscribers.

When the storm made landfall on October 29th but the Police Department had already geared up, notifying all officers to expect to be called in to work. The Rescue Squad and Fire Departments were both fully staffed at their headquarters. Once the trees and wires started coming down, the Public Works and Fire Departments hit the streets in force, answering calls for downed trees and

wires non-stop. The Borough's OEM team met every few hours at Police Headquarters to keep up with the storm's effects. Power went out for everyone by dinner time and emergency generators kicked on at Police/Fire Headquarters and the Rescue Squad. The worst of the wind and rain continued Monday evening into Tuesday the 30th.

By Tuesday morning, it was apparent that the storm had caused epic damage across the Northeast. During the first of many conference calls with

PSE&G, the utility reported 2.4 million customers in New Jersey without power. Reports from Fanwood police patrols and public works crews indicated most, if not all, of our town had no power, which also meant no cable TV, internet or telephone and little or no cell phone service. Downed trees and wires blocked Martine Avenue, Midway Avenue, LaGrande Avenue and many other streets throughout the Borough. Trees came down onto at least a dozen homes, causing those residents to find other places to live temporarily. Traffic lights at our major intersections stopped working. All our businesses were dark except for the A&P, which had power for lights but little else. And Nick's Pizza and Pasta continued baking pizzas despite having no power.

After declaring a local emergency, Mayor Mahr began steering the OEM meetings towards what would turn out to be a key element of the post-Sandy response--figuring out how to communicate with residents in a town with no power, internet, television or cell phone service, and with limited mobility in an unsafe environment. By lunchtime on Tuesday, a one-page flyer was drafted with essential information including what we knew about power, damage in town, safety warnings and a device charging/information station created at the Fanwood Memorial Library. In the absence of electronic delivery systems, the flyers were delivered door to door by police officers and volunteers of the Rescue Squad and Fire Department. This would be repeated on two other occasions as power was slow to return. Police visited senior citizens and special needs residents, and began managing intersections where there were no lights.

Borough Hall was staffed throughout the storm,

including weekends.


Numerous volunteers assisted with answering phones and walk-in inquiries. The Borough continued daily information updates utilizing its website, email, Union County First Alert texts and reverse 911 calls. In addition, members of the OEM team spoke to groups of residents in the neighborhoods to spread information.

On Wednesday, October 31st, the Rescue Squad

opened its device-charging station and the Chelsea opened as a warming station. In the interest of safety, all Halloween activities were reluctantly cancelled. Borough Hall was reopened for regular business. Public works was clearing trees from the roadways 24/7.

The Fanwood Memorial Library and Fanwood Rescue Squad, both of which have natural gas-powered generators, became hubs of social activity as residents came by the hundreds to get warm and charge their phones and iPads. By the end of Friday, November 9th, the library had seen 5,000 people sign-up to recharge devises anduse the Internet and the Rescue Squad hosted 368.

PSE&G faced what was perhaps its greatest challenge ever, in terms of the ndamage to its power lines and infrastructure. Extensive damage to a switching station at Sewaren, Woodbridge Township, contributed to the





Shopping Safety Tips


- Do not leave purchased items visible in the car, leave them in the trunk.
- While shopping in the evening hours may be less crowded, there are additional potential risks involved. Park in areas of parking lots that have adequate lighting. Consider shopping with someone rather than going alone.
- Make sure purses and wallets are secure on your person and you are aware of their location at all times.
- Keep the amount of available cash you have at a minimum or separate it into different pockets or locations on or about your person. This way all of it is not lost if your purse or wallet is misplaced or stolen.



- Remain aware of your surroundings at all times and move to and from your vehicle with confidence and purpose. Have keys ready *before* getting to your car so you don't have to search for them while standing near it.
- Report suspicious people or activity to law enforcement immediately!

Home Safety Tips While Away

- Valuable items, such as televisions, stereos, and computers should be inscribed with an identifying number unique to its owner (do not use your entire social security number).
- Create an up-to-date home inventory including make, model, serial numbers, other detailed descriptions, and photographs of items of value (including jewelry). This inventory should be kept somewhere safe, outside the house.
- At least two light timers should be set to turn the lights and TV on and off in a logical sequence when away for an extended time period to give the appearance that someone is home.
- If you have an alarm system you should activate it before you leave home.
- Mail and newspaper deliveries should be stopped or arrangements for a neighbor/friend to pick them up should be made when you are away from home for a period of time.
- Ask a trusted neighbor to tend the yard, shovel the snow, and watch your home when you are away or have a trusted friend or relative house sit in your absence.
- Make sure all doors and windows are locked when you leave, even if you have an alarm system.
- Provide the police with a complete vacant house form, available at Fanwood Police Department Headquarters.



Renew Pet Licenses

All dogs and cats in Fanwood, seven months or older, are required to be licensed annually. The license fees are \$10 per dog

or cat who are spayed/neutered; \$15 for those who are not spayed/neutered. The deadline for obtaining the license is January 31, 2013, or a late fee will be imposed. If you no longer own a dog or cat, please

inform the Borough by calling (908) 322-8236.

Licenses may be obtained in person at the Municipal Clerk's office at the Fanwood Borough Hall. Office hours are Monday-Friday, 8 AM - 4 PM; and Thursday evenings from 5 PM - 8 PM. Credit cards are also accepted. Residents can also obtain licenses by mail; the proper fee, current rabies vaccination certificate and/or prior year's license must be included along with a self-addressed stamped envelope to Fanwood Borough Hall, 75 N. Martine Avenue.

the rink to be filled with water and turned into a frozen pond.

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Recycling Center Serves Borough and Beyond



Fanwood is the only community in Union County that does not have curbside pickup for recyclables. This policy saves taxpayer money, generates over \$20,000 worth of grants to local

service organizations and, allows us to recycle many more materials than elsewhere. Perhaps it is that breadth that attracts residents of other communities to our Recycling Center. A recent month-long survey showed that 70% of the users were Fanwood residents; the remaining 30% came from 16 other communities in Union County, as well as towns as far away as Bridgewater, Morristown, and Kearny. We are having an impact well beyond the confines of our borough.

The Fanwood-Scotch Plains Recycling Association, the all-volunteer organization that manages and staffs the Center, continues to expand the types of materials residents can recycle. Since starting collection of fluorescent

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delay in restoring power. Power did return to a few Fanwood homes after the first day. Many more homes had power restored after five to seven days. Several streets and some individual homes went thirteen days without electricity.

Surviving a catastrophic event couldn't happen without the town's residents and businesses coming together to help each other. Residents with generators opened their homes to their neighbors and, later, loaned generators to families without power. Our Senior Citizens Club assisted in doing phone checks on senior residents. The Chelsea provided meals, and even lodging, to our police officers and public works employees. Volunteers helped deliver flyers.

While patience wore thin for those without power the longest, we saw a great convergence of Fanwood's positive forces in the days after Hurricane Sandy. Let's hope we don't have to do this again for a long time.

bulbs last August, over 4000 bulbs have been processed through the cooperation of the Home Depot store in Watchung Square Mall. We recently started to collect button batteries used in hearing aids and watches. A full listing of accepted recyclables is posted on the Fanwood website under the Department of Public Works. Uncommon recyclables include:

- Used ink cartridges
- Rigid plastic products, such as patio furniture, toys, pots
- Compact discs/DVDs
- Aluminum products, such as gutters, doors, lawn chairs
