## Fanwood remembers, honors fallen heroes

*Memorial Day weekend activities include Sunday evening concert, Monday services and parade*



Fanwood and the nation will pause on the last weekend of May to honor and remember the men and women of the U.S. armed forces who have given their lives in service for the country.

A concert of patriotic music will kick off the holiday observance Sunday evening. A memorial service at the Fanwood Memorial Library is planned for Monday morning. Later, the annual parade steps off in Scotch Plains, moving down Martine Avenue and ending in Fanwood's LaGrande Park.

"I'm inviting the residents to bring their families to the north lawn of the train station for an evening filled with patriotic music honoring the men and women who made the ultimate sacrifice," Mayor Colleen Mahr said.

"This concert is a wonderful way to remind us what makes being an American so special," she added.

Council member Anthony Parenti, a member of the Memorial Day committee, says the concert and its music is a good way to remind people that the weekend is dedicated to honoring the fallen.

"A lot of people think Memorial Day is the beginning of summer," he says. "Somewhere they lose sight of the meaning of the day."

Parenti says the patriotic music and other parts of the concert are a good reminder.

Last year's concert drew nearly 500 visitors, Parenti says, and a larger crowd is expected this year. Concertgoers are asked to bring chairs.

In case of rain, the concert will be moved to the high school. An alert will be posted on the borough's website and also distributed via email.

Local veterans from several wars will form the honor guard at the library ceremony Monday morning for Fanwoodians who gave their lives for their country.

After Scotch Plains' memorial service, the annual parade steps off from the Scotch Plains Municipal Building, making its way down Park Avenue and Fanwood's Martine Avenue to LaGrande Park.

Four Scotch Plains police officers, all Iraq War veterans with the U.S. Marines, will be this year's parade Grand Marshals: Brad Belford, David Belford, David Lavery and Christen Ostrowski.

The annual parade draws crowds that line the curbs to watch dozens of veterans, local civic groups, first responders and youth groups march in honor of the nation's fallen.

We're very pleased to see them doing so well, and urge you to remember that you also can get delicious soup, sandwiches and ice cream treats from the Double Dipper and the best bagels in the county at Fanwood Bagel! Be sure to explore all the dining options that are now available in our bustling downtown, and elsewhere in town. Up the road, we have the Chippery due to open soon and down the road we'll soon have 25 South, a new wood-burning oven pizzeria. It is wonderful to have so many choices right here in our home town!

Also coming soon to South Avenue is CKO Kickboxing, a fun fitness studio to burn off those extra calories! I hope you will all be sure to visit the new merchants and support local business; the more we patronize our local shops, the more vibrant the downtown will be for us all to enjoy.

On that note, many thanks to Tracey Constandi, president of the Fanwood Business/Professional Association. Her continued leadership has been exceptional and we congratulate her, and all our local businesses, on the success of the 2nd Annual Ladies Night Out earlier in May. It was wonderful to see so many of you shopping downtown and having a blast! Hats off to our Shade Tree Commission! Led for many years by Chairman Steve Falco, Fanwood has been recognized nationally by the Arbor Day Foundation for our commitment to sound urban forestry management. Our town recently celebrated its 20th year as a Tree City USA!!

I also want to thank commissioners April Lee, Joanne Muoio, Joe Higenbotham, Tom Plante and Earl Phillips for the dedication they all demonstrate toward keeping our streets shady and our trees healthy!

In the coming months you will see a lot of capital improvement projects throughout the borough. Forest Road Park is under construction for the installation of a ¼ mile walking track, field irrigation and some buffer landscaping. The Glenwood Road area will soon see the start of a large infrastructure project to improve area drainage. Due for completion by the end of the year, Glenwood, Birchwood, Waldon, Timberline & Tillotson will all be involved. There will be engineers on site, so if homeowners have questions or problems, please speak to the site manager. Failing that, call Borough Hall at (908) 322-8236.

Farley Avenue residents will be pleased to hear that the contract for Farley Avenue re-paving should be complete by September. Hunter Avenue also will see improvements this year. In 2013 we will focus on Hunter Avenue from North Avenue to Watson Road as well as the section of Hunter between Midway Avenue and the Scotch Plains border. These sections should be complete in October, with the remainder of Hunter Avenue scheduled for re-paving in 2014.

Finally, on May 28, Borough Hall will begin "summer hours," opening each morning at 7:30 and closing at noon on Fridays. Monday through Thursday closing time will remain at 4 p.m., and on Thursday, evening hours will continue from 5-8 p.m.

I wish you the best of health and happiness for the summer of 2013, and hope to see you at the Memorial Day Concert on May 26 and the parade on May 27. Don't forget the sunscreen!

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# Mara's Bakery and Cafe opens at Fanwood Crossing

There's one item that the co-owners of Mara's Cafe and Bakery at Fanwood Crossing can cross off their busy to-do list.

That's planning a grand opening to draw a crowd for Fanwood's newest restaurant.

The cafe's turnout has "exploded" beyond the wildest expectations of Fanwood's Marci (shown at right with one of the restaurant's desserts) and Mark Semel, Mara's co-owners. The crowds have been steady since the "soft" opening in late April, even during times the Semels thought it might be quiet. Mid-morning, lunch and after-school crowds have been unexpectedly big, Marci says.

They've hardly had a chance to catch their breath, Marci says, "which we are happy about."

Looking ahead, she says, "I think we are having our boom and I think then it will settle." But, she expects there will be many new customers as the warm weather brings an interest in the gelato.

Diners have a wide variety of choices in the restaurant that is a bit of a hybrid.

Marci explains, "we're not really a full-service restaurant, but we're not a fast-food restaurant either." The place is informal, but with a wide variety of items on the menu. Call it a coffee house with a little more polish. There's no TV, by design, but Mara's does offer free wi-fi to customers.

In the morning, there's a selection of breakfast sandwiches, omelets and quiches, along with a dozen different muffins (breakfast price range: \$1.25-\$8). At

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## Meet Fanwood's "Mr. Parade"

lunch (\$6-\$9), there's a long list of salads, artisan sandwiches, wraps, paninis and quiches to enjoy. And, the dinner menu has all of that and adds a range of items from chicken parm to chicken pot pie to some pasta selections. There is a big menu for the kids, too.



At least nine different coffees are brewing at all times. And, there are enough dessert options (brownies, gelato, pies, cakes, etc.) to fill any appetite.

Next up? An app for smartphones so customers can order their breakfast as they leave home in the morning. Or, on their way home from the office, they'll be able to order dinner for pickup.

## Chippery nearing opening

Many people in the Fanwood area remember long lines and the crispy fish and chips at the old Chippery. Brian Walter is hoping to restore those memories with the upcoming opening of the new Chippery at its old spot on South Avenue in the borough.

Walter is the landmark's new owner and he's been wading through more than 30 months of paperwork, planning, permits and construction to get Fanwood's "old friend" up and running.

Now, with the old favorites still on the menu and some new additions planned, too, Walter says he will open the restaurant by the end of the summer.

The 33-year-old chef and restaurateur, who also owns Oh' Brian's Pour House on South Avenue, had hoped to quickly reopen the Chippery when he bought it in early 2011 from the longtime owners, the O'Brien family. But, the building had been closed for several years and was in disrepair so Walter decided to start over fresh. Then,

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# Community invited to joint police discussion

Mayor Colleen Mahr will schedule a June meeting to invite public input on the creation of a joint Fanwood/Scotch Plains police department

"We have spent a lot of time looking at this complex issue and we want to be able to discuss our findings and our recommendations with the public," Mayor Mahr said.

Joined by Scotch Plains Mayor Kevin Glover, the two agreed, "The

reason that we are even discussing this possible merger is because of the continuing budget pressures that local governments, including Scotch Plains and Fanwood, are experiencing year after year."

"You must also consider," continued Mayor Mahr, "that the governor's office is pushing us in this direction. If we did not at least study this seriously, we might find a joint police force, or even a merger of the two towns, imposed on us."

Declining revenues, state-ordered caps on spending and taxes coupled with rising costs have made it imperative for all towns throughout the state to investigate other ways to deliver services. Both mayors emphasized, "We're not able to just continue to reach into the pockets of our respective taxpayers. Towns are looking at ways to provide services through a different avenue. This is happening all over the state."

The joint police department is an obvious possibility, because of the geography involved, with Fanwood sharing borders with Scotch Plains on three sides.

Mayor Mahr stressed that no changes would be made that diminish the level of service or put public safety in jeopardy. "Any sort of shared service must save taxpayer dollars and services must be equal to existing services or improve them," adding, "the basic premise has been, from the very beginning, that a joint police department would be a police department in which Fanwood has an equal voice in the operation."

A date and place for the meeting has not been set at this time but announcements will be circulated through the township's and borough's websites and email channels and in the local media. Mayor Mahr stated that she is really looking forward to having a conversation with the community on the findings.

## Bulk pickup reminder

Residents are reminded that the borough's annual bulk waste cleanup program will be held again in September. The cleanup is for items that you can't usually be included in the trash pickups or recycled - air conditioners, mattresses, furniture, barbecue grills, etc. - and each home is limited to 750 pounds. Permits must be purchased for \$65 at Borough Hall before Sept. 2.

## Planning underway for Street Fair, Fanny Wood Day

Fanwood's downtown will be the focus with two big gatherings coming up.

The annual borough Street Fair will take place Sunday, June 9, from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. with more than 200 artists, crafters, and vendors. Many vendors will also feature raffles and giveaways. There will also be live music and rides for the kids.

Then, after Labor Day, the 18<sup>th</sup> annual Fanny Wood Day celebration will be held Sunday, Sept. 29, from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. The event turns the downtown into a giant block party complete with music, activities and vendors.

## Poetry series marks 15th season

The Carriage House Poetry Series, the long-running series of free monthly gatherings devoted to writing, reading and appreciating poetry, is celebrating its 15<sup>th</sup> year at the Patricia Kuran Cultural Arts Center, the historic white carriage house structure adjacent to Fanwood Borough Hall.

The series has a June event planned before taking July and August off, then resumes its monthly events through the end of the year.

The poetry series opened on Dec. 10, 1998, and has presented more than 200 distinguished poets, poetry journal editors, and winners of various honors and awards.

Poetry performances begin at 8 p.m. on the third Tuesday of each month at the Kuran Center. One or two featured poets usually start the evening and read for a half hour or more from their work. After a short intermission, there is usually an "open" session which gives local poets a chance to read one of their own poems to the group.

The Carriage House poetry events are free and the public is invited. There's room for parking along Watson Road and in the lot at Carriage House Park.

## Music series wraps up 5th year

Five years in, performance series committee member David Blechinger says the music is great, the crowds are turning out and the venue keeps getting better and better.

Blechinger credits a great venue, the Kuran Arts Center on Watson Road, and an appreciative audience for putting Fanwood on the music map.

For artists used to playing noisy venues like bars and other places where the music competes for attention, the Kuran venue is tremendous.

"The artists like playing our series because it is a listening thing for the audience," Blechinger says. "The audiences come to listen to the musicians. The musicians love our venue for that reason - it is like a little listening room."

More and more shows are standing room only, or even sold out, and there is tremendous support from the community, including local restaurants that contribute food that's sold at intermission with the money going to paying musicians and keeping the venue going.

Blechinger sees a bright future for the series. "We came together as a community of people and we have prospered by word of mouth."

The series wraps up its 2013 season on June 8 with the Madison Brass Quintet, whose selections "stretch from Bach to Broadway and beyond."

## Helping Hands helping seniors

when old fuel storage tanks were discovered under the parking lot and had to be removed, the process was delayed again.

Walter took that opportunity to design and build a more modern, efficient operation, but all of that took time. His plans for a "turnkey" purchase and opening went out the window. Months turned into years but, Walter says, his "dream" is now within sight.

The Fanwood Chippery opened in 1970 and was later a part of an eight-restaurant Chippery chain in Union and Middlesex counties. It had achieved



enough renown as a fish and chips place that it was even reviewed in the New York Times in 2005 ("The golden-fried fish is so good

that customers will often pack in like sardines just to get a taste," the Times said). By 2008, when the Fanwood location closed, it was the last survivor.

He says the restaurant will have strong ties to Fanwood - he's planning to hire locally, just as the previous owners did. Many a local high school kid earned spending money working at the old Chippery and Walter hopes to keep that tradition going.

Walter promises all of the old favorites will be there from Day One. If you want a "Captain," you'll get it. "I have the original chips recipe, the original batter. Everything that people loved about the old Chippery will still be there," he says.

After the opening angst settles, Walter is going to update the menu a bit with the addition of salmon, mussels, clams and other seafood and accompaniments. Everything will be available to eat in or as dinners to go. Or, Walter says, you'll be able to buy anything on the menu, along with the Chippery batter, to do your own seafood recipes or Chippery dinners at home.

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# Yikes, the cicadas (crunch) are coming!

Get out your earplugs and the biggest broom you have. Our area is bracing for the arrival of the 17-year cicadas, known as the Brood II invasion.

The actual emergence of the cicadas, which don't do any real harm but are a great annoyance with their noise and shell refuse, depends largely on the temperature of the soil - it must maintain a steady 64 degrees, eight inches below the surface. Residents are already seeing the small holes in their yards from which the cicadas will arrive.

It is estimated that Fanwood, Scotch Plains and surrounding areas will be inundated with approximately 1.5 million of these creatures per square acre and 1 billion per square mile. The duration of this invasion is 4-6 weeks.

It is important to know that cicadas do not harm people, pets, trees or other plant life. They cannot bite. Experts warn to not use pesticides in an attempt to kill them, as you may inadvertently harm other things. Instead, allow the cycle to run its course.

They will no doubt be a nuisance in the weeks to come as they will encompass tree trunks, limbs, fencing, porch

and window screens and anything from about a foot off the ground.

The males' mating ritual involves the rubbing together of its wings; this collective sound could reach 100 decibels.

The female cicadas will be busy laying eggs, usually on tree branches. If residents have any new plantings and/or fruit trees, netting of 1/2 inch or smaller

may protect them. Natural predators such as birds, wasps, foxes, as well as house pets (dogs, outdoor cats) will have a "field day" when the cicadas arrive as they are lean and a good source of protein.
