Borough garners high rankings in biennial magazine survey

Fifteen years ago, when Darlene and Joe Rigney were looking to move to New Jersey from Long Island, Fanwood wasn't on their radar. After house-hunting in the nearby towns, and not having any success after bidding on a couple of homes, they broadened their search a bit and looked in Fanwood.

After seeing what the borough had to offer, it was clear to them - Fanwood would be their new home.

"It was a nice area and we were looking for an older home," Darlene said. Joe added, "A lot of it is economics. You can still get in here at a fairly reasonable level."

They've not regretted that choice since and, like so many other young marrieds, they've found Fanwood to be a great place to make their home and raise their families. So much so, that New Jersey Monthly Magazine has named the borough the #3 location in the state for raising a young family. That honor is backed up by the borough's Top 100 rating in the same survey in the category of "Best Places to Live."

"I wasn't at all surprised with the recognition," said Mayor Colleen Mahr. "I have three young sons and, like so many of you, I love the community spirit we enjoy here in Fanwood. In addition to the great schools and municipal services, I think the folks who want to raise their families in Fanwood are looking for that Mayberry feel, and we've got it!"

Parenti ends long term of service to the borough

Not many people can say they've served the citizens of Fanwood for longer than Tony Parenti. First, as a Police Department patrolman beginning in 1957, rising through the

ranks to chief before retiring in 1998, then later as a member of the borough's council for two terms, Parenti has more than 47 years of service to the community.

That chapter in Parenti's life and the borough's history comes to a close at the end of the year with his departure from the council. He says it is time to rest up a bit and spend more time with his grandchildren.

After serving in the U.S. Air Force, Parenti joined the Plainfield police force in 1956

before moving over to the Fanwood department a year later. Moving up through the ranks to lieutenant, Parenti was the department's first Traffic Safety Officer.

Later, as chief, Parenti was one of the founders and a former president of the New Jersey Police Traffic Officers Association and built a national reputation on the subject, even authoring a weekly newspaper column on traffic safety for the Courier News.

Parenti retired from the force on the last day of 1998 but didn't get out of police work. Instead, he took over the leadership of the John H. Stamler Police Academy in Scotch Plains five days later, serving as director until 2007.

After attending borough council meetings for several years as police chief, Parenti had acquired an interest in local government and, after his retirement from police work, was elected for two three-year terms to council.

His second term ends on New Year's Eve this year and the man, who in his spare time has owned more than 100 race horses over the years and aspired to be a harness race driver before a motorcycle injury in 1982 ended that career, will step down from public life.

If he follows his normal form, though, there's a good chance you'll still see him involved around the town he has called home for more than 50 years. It seems like Parenti and retirement just don't mix.

There have been many exciting developments in Fanwood recently, but none more important than the possible creation of a joint Fanwood and Scotch Plains Police Department.

We have spent several years in discussion; working with Scotch Plains elected officials, professionals, police chiefs of both towns and the labor attorneys representing the PBAs of both forces.

On Oct. 21, we held a public meeting at the high school to share our findings and heard thoughtful and worthwhile comments from the public to take into consideration as we continue this discussion.

We've crafted a proposal that helps both towns. Both will have an equal voice in the governance of the proposed department and more importantly, all our residents will enjoy better police services at a lower cost.

Fanwood Police Chief Richard Trigo laid out a plan where public safety and response time would not be jeopardized and more officers would be available to serve at every hour of every day. We anticipate having officers "walking a beat," a welcome return to community policing that benefits everyone. The proposed expansion of the DARE program that is so valuable to students is just another benefit. And a joint force is estimated to generate close to \$200,000 in annual savings for Fanwood.

I do not take the concerns you may have with this concept lightly. However when property taxes remain the #1 issue on people's minds, it is our duty to investigate. There will be more public meetings on this subject. Please watch for developments.

In this age of dwindling state funding, pursuing grants is vital. I am happy to report that we have succeeded in securing grants to improve quality of life and keep taxes down. Recently we've won a grant for \$18,000 from the Union County Kids Recreation Trust Fund to support our parks and \$142,000 from FEMA to replace the aging gasoline generator at Borough Hall with an efficient natural gas generator. Fanwood was one of only 15 winners out of dozens of applicants for the FEMA grant. We've also received Union County Heart Grant monies to support cultural programs, and two grants from Sustainable New Jersey to continue work in environmental stewardship. These are in addition to the street improvement grants we compete for each year in order to fund the ongoing effort to maintain our roads.

As a result, we've done a good deal of capital improvement in the borough over the last months. Hunter Avenue and Farley Road have been repaved, Glenwood Avenue is in the midst of a large-scale drainage upgrade and the downtown Municipal Parking Lot has been completely reconstructed. Once the parking lot is

complete, you can expect to see construction begin on the next mixed-use building on South Avenue.

You'll note that retailers are beginning to take notice that Fanwood is an attractive place to do business, and I am happy to welcome our newest business, Sky Yoga, to our local business community.

Enhancing quality of life continues to top my agenda for Fanwood. So, imagine boarding a train in Fanwood and not changing trains in Newark en route to New York City. That dream is possible.

I've been working with the Raritan Valley Rail Coalition (RVRC) to lobby New Jersey Transit (NJT) to bring the "One-Seat-Ride" to the Raritan Valley line. With the Raritan Valley Line comprising nearly 10% of NJT ridership and NJT's recent purchase of 35 dual-power locomotives, now is the time to act. I am leading an active group of Mayors along the line and we are serious about achieving this goal.

Part of our work is to raise awareness among residents/commuters and to encourage you to share your thoughts on this with New Jersey Transit.

Visit http://www.raritanvalleyrail.com/, where you can learn about the issue and how you can make your voice heard. After the ARC Tunnel Project was killed, this is the last opportunity for us to act. It's up to us to make this happen!

I sadly bid a very fond farewell to our departing Councilman and former Police Chief, Anthony Parenti. After a lifetime of service to the Borough of Fanwood, the "Chief" is stepping down from public office. There is an article on his achievements on page 2 in this issue. I hope you will read it. Tony Parenti is a very special member of our community and we wish him all the best in his retirement from public life.

A town like Fanwood couldn't function without the dozens of volunteers who work in a variety of capacities, from Shade Tree to Recreation to the Rescue Squad to the Planning Board. We all owe a debt of thanks to these volunteers.

Volunteering can be very rewarding and it is a great way for you to meet your neighbors and have an impact on life in Fanwood.

This year we are hoping to establish a special committee to mark Fanwood's 25th year celebrating Earth Day. I am hoping folks of all ages will volunteer to work on this project. They point to the schools as a great asset.

"We've been grateful for the schools," Joe said. "We are happy with our sons' (eighth-grader Jack and sixth-grader Kyle) progress as students. We like that there is diversity. The kids are going to school with students who represent the world we live in today."

"We are also very pleased with the level of engagement with the parents and the families," he added. "There is a lot of volunteerism for the schools." "In this situation, people know where their kids are and they are engaged. That breeds a strong sense of community. It's an area without a lot of pretense."

Striking a balance and making the puzzle pieces fit

You can call Ray Sullivan, the borough's Zoning Officer, the puzzle master.

It's Sullivan's task to make sure the borough's zoning rules for the 2,483 homes and 250 businesses are adhered to. That can include anything from how a business' sign is displayed to a new fence that a homeowner wants to install. Zoning rules detail how the new mix of housing and business in the Fanwood Crossing works, for instance. It is a balance of housing density, business use and other items such as parking.

And, Sullivan also makes suggestions to the borough's planners on how to make changes to the

The Borough Council is evaluating whether to continue the current process, move to curbside recycling or institute some hybrid model. There are clearly multiple costs and benefits to consider in each method.


