LaGrande Park site of a big doubleheader, baseball and Rockin' for Autism, April 16

Property tax relief available for disabled, vets, seniors

Seniors, disabled persons and veterans may be eligible for property tax relief programs.

If you are over 65, or disabled, with annual income of less than \$10,000 (not including Social Security), you may qualify for a \$250 deduction on your property taxes.

If you are over 65 and your combined income, including all sources, does not exceed a certain threshold (in 2015, it was \$70,000), you may qualify to have your taxes frozen.

If you are a veteran who served during active wartime, you also may qualify for a \$250 property tax deduction. In addition, veterans who are 100% disabled as a result of service-related injuries may be entitled to be 100% exempt from property taxes.

It's a busy spring for local authors

Three Fanwood writers, two poets and a journalist chronicling a major story from the past, have new books coming out this spring.

Adele Kenny, Tom Plante and Tom Kranz have a wide range of writing experience and their books show their different approaches to storytelling.

Kenny's latest publication is a book of Haiku, Not Asking What If?, her 24th book in a collection that ranges from poetry to antiques and collectibles to educational volumes.

She's been writing poetry since she was a child but didn't begin publishing her work until 1981.

Kenny, Fanwood's Poet Laureate, was asked by the publisher, Muse-Pie of Passaic, N.J., to assemble the newest collection. She says most of her books, "are put together over a period of time. The poems are individual pieces that become collections."

Plante is publishing his third book of poetry, this time through Finish Line Press. The book, Atlas Apothecary, is titled after one of the poems in the latest collection.

Plante, who had his first work published when he was in high school, says it is a long process to pull together a collection. "I sit down and write a poem," he says. "If I am satisfied with it, that's a good thing."

A new collection begins to come together over time. "These are the poems I keep going back to and reading," he says. They become your favorites."

Kranz's book, Liveshot: Journalistic Heroism in Philadelphia, is the story behind the 1985 MOVE occupation in a neighborhood in Philadelphia, which ended when police bombed the house and a resulting fire leveled the whole block, killing eleven members of the MOVE group, including five children.

Kranz was a television news producer at the time, assigned to the story which unfolded over several days. He followed up with interviews of journalists and others who were there and viewed hours and hours of television news coverage to tell the story of what was one of the biggest stories of many journalists' careers.

Kranz's book is available as an electronic book in the Kindle format on Amazon.

Fanwood Police add cameras to their crime-fighting tools

Fanwood Police are on the street now with new tools in their crime-fighting arsenal. And, Chief Richard Trigo says, the tools will "promote safety, professionalism and accountability."

The new tool is a 3.5-ounce body video camera which each uniformed Fanwood Police officer wears while on duty.

The initiative is part of a three-year pilot program among eight of the 21 police departments in Union County. Using a mix of state and county funds derived from money forfeited during criminal investigations, the county is buying the cameras and will pay for the first year of associated maintenance and fees. Fanwood will pick up the costs of the fees, estimated at \$670 per camera, for years two and three of the project.

A camera is assigned to each uniformed officer. The officer activates the camera, which can retain up to nine hours of audio and video, when making traffic stops, vehicle searches, arrests and handling other incidents. At the end of each shift, the officer places the camera in a docking station at headquarters to

charge and to download data to a cloud-based server.

Fanwood has had on-board cameras in its police cruisers for 15-20 years, Trigo said, but this will be the first time that individual officers will be equipped with body cameras. "This is the way to do police

work, he said. "If a picture is worth a thousand words, imagine if you have audio, too."

Trigo calls the project, "a win-win situation" for everyone involved - the police and the public.

John Piccola of Fanwood's Dept. of Public Works clears snow from Watson Road after a massive blizzard buried the borough in more than two feet of snow in January. The storm, which lasted 24 hours and produced near whiteout conditions at times, set snowfall records across the state. Within 24 hours of the end of the storm, Fanwood DPW crews had all primary roads open and had most of the secondary roads passable, too.
