

DIRECTIONS FOR 2016 EVENTS

ALCATEL-LUCENT, NEW PROVIDENCE

Take Martine Avenue towards Route 22, making a left onto the overpass, heading to Route 78). At 1st light, turn onto New Providence/Diamond Hill Road. Continue straight for 3 lights. At 3rd light, make a right. Alcatel-Lucent is the 1st light on the right

CEDAR BROOK PARK, PARK AVENUE, PLAINFIELD

Take South Ave. toward Plainfield, passing Terrill Rd. and Leland Ave. Proceed .3 miles past Leland Ave., and make a left onto Woodland Ave. In approx. 1.5 miles, turn right onto South End Ave. Cross over Park Ave., directly into Cedar Brook Park.

CLARK PUBLIC WORKS, 315 WESTFIELD AVENUE, CLARK

The entrance to the DPW is on the left hand side, between the police station and the ALJ High School.

KEAN UNIVERSITY, 1000 MORRIS AVENUE, UNION

From the Garden State Parkway Northbound: Take Garden state Parkway to Exit 140. Keep right and follow signs for Route 82 East towards Elizabeth (Morris Ave. East). Stay on Morris Avenue (Route 82 East) and Kean University Campus will be 2 miles down on your right.

From the Garden State Parkway Southbound: Take Garden State Parkway to Exit 140-A onto Route 22 West. Keep right and follow sign to Elizabeth (Route 82 East). Turn right on Morris Avenue (Route 82 East). Stay on Morris Avenue (Route 82 East) and Kean University Campus will be 2 miles on your right.

LINDEN RECYCLING CENTER, 2 DONALDSON PLACE

Take Martine Avenue/Lake Avenue to St. Georges Avenue. Turn left on St. George to Stiles Street. Make Right on Stiles. Stay on Stiles to W. Elizabeth Ave., (approx. 1.3 miles) and turn left. Entrance to Linden Recycling Center is 300 feet on your right.

RAHWAY RIVER PARK (ST. GEORGES AVE.) RAHWAY

Take St. Georges Ave., (Rt. 27) into Rahway. Entrance to the Park is on the right between Scott Ave. and W. Grand Ave.). Follow signs once in the Park.

UNION COUNTY COLLEGE, CRANFORD

Take Route 22 to Cranford/Westfield Exit (Springfield Avenue). Proceed towards Cranford. At fourth light, turn right onto Springfield Avenue. College is two blocks down on right hand side. Make a right into main parking lot and proceed to BACK parking lot.

UNION COUNTY VO-TECH, SCOTCH PLAINS

Follow signs for John H. Stamler Police Academy) Terrill Road South onto Raritan Road.. The Union County Vocational/ Technical School, is located on Raritan Rd. - ¼ mile on your right, Enter Vo/Tech driveway and bear right. The Academy is located in the back of the campus parking lot.

WESTFIELD MEMORIAL POOL, 715 CUMBERLAND STREET, WESTFIELD:

~~From South Avenue, make right onto W. Broad Street just before traffic circle. Take W. Broad for ½ mile. Pool entrance will be on right hand side.~~

IMPORTANT NOTE:

New Jersey Stormwater Management Regulations and Borough Ordinance 05-24-R, state that *“Brush, leaves or vegetative waste may not be placed within 10’ of a drainage inlet or in the roadway no more than 7 days prior to the scheduled pickup.”* Please note the dates for placement of the materials in the street. It is the resident’s responsibility to notify their landscapers of the rules, restrictions and regulations for each program.

SPRING LEAF PICK UP: April 11 through April 15 (all quadrants)

Leaves must be at the curb in neat windrows for pick up by Monday, April 11 at 7:00 a.m. Do not place leaves in the street prior to April 4. Gum balls are permitted to be included in leaf piles, but leaf piles containing branches or other material will not be picked up. Bagged leaves must be removed from the bags prior to placement at the curb.

Landscapers are not permitted to place material in the street other than for the dates shown herein.

BRUSH & BRANCH PICK UP PROGRAMS

NE & NW Quadrants: April 18, June 6, September 6, (Due to 9/5 holiday) & January 3, 2017
SE & SW Quadrants: April 25, June 13, September 12 & January 9, 2017

This program is for brush & branches only! Materials are to be placed curbside by 7:00 a.m. on Monday on the dates above. Each resident will receive one (1) pickup during their scheduled week. Branches **shall not** exceed 4’ in length and may not exceed 12” in diameter. Materials should not obstruct roadways and sidewalks. Leaves are not permitted in the Brush program. Do not place material in the street more than 7 days prior to the dates above.

Landscapers are not permitted to place material in the street other than for the dates shown herein.

GRASS CLIPPINGS

Grass clippings provide beneficial nutrients to gardens and lawns reducing the need for fertilizers and contributing to the soils organic matter. It is recommended to mow your grass with a mulching mower, when done properly, you are left with neat, “just vacuumed” appearance. And thatch is not a problem incurred with mulching mowers, a common misconception. Thatch is the result of excess surface roots caused by over-watering and over-fertilizing. If you do not own a mulching mower, simply use the clippings as a garden mulch, spreading it on the surface to help eliminate weed growth, reduce soil spattering and crusting and also to help moderate the soil temperature.

If you choose to not mulch your grass, it is the responsibility of the residents to contract with their private garbage hauler or scavenger to dispose of grass clippings. **The Borough does not provide pickup of grass clippings therefore placing grass in the street is prohibited. Do not mix grass with brush and/or leaves.**

FANWOOD BULK WASTE CLEANUP PROGRAM

NW & NE Quadrants: September 19
SW & SE Quadrants: September 26

Bulk waste pickup requires a \$65.00 permit for a one-time pickup of material, not to exceed 750 lbs. See Page 6 for details and application. Materials shall not obstruct roads or sidewalks. Hazardous waste is unacceptable for this program. (See “*Union County Special Waste Collection*” on Pg. 10).

FALL LEAF PICK UP PROGRAM

October 17 – December 5

In order to promote efficient pickup, please do not park your vehicles within 20’ of the leaf piles.

Leaves **must** be at the curb in neat windrows for pick up. **Do not place leaves in the street prior to October 10.** Gum balls are permitted to be included in leaf piles, but leaf piles containing branches or other material will **not** be picked up. Bagged leaves must be removed from the bags prior to placement at the curb.

Leaves for the **final pickup** must be at the curb December 5 by 7:00 a.m.


Leaves accumulated after December 5 are to be stored on the resident’s property in order to prepare the streets for effective plowing during winter storms.

CHRISTMAS TREE PICKUP (2017) January 3 to January 31 (all quadrants)

Wreaths and garlands are not acceptable for pickup.

NOTE: Residents are free to drop Christmas trees at the Recycling Center only on Wednesdays in January from 9:00am to 1:00pm until January 25 (last Wednesday in January).

- Collect and transport recyclable materials in re-usable containers. All containers to be taken away by the resident.
- When entering the site unlock your trunk and remain in your car except on Wednesday, where you must “do it yourself.”
- The North Avenue Recycling Center is available for use by both residents and non-residents.
- **BRANCHES, BRUSH OR LEAVES ARE NOT ACCEPTED AT THE CENTER.**

OUR SUCCESS DEPENDS ON YOUR INVOLVEMENT & COOPERATION

Keep pollution out of storm drains

- Municipalities and many other public agencies are required to mark storm drain inlets with messages reminding people that storm drains are connected to local waterbodies.
- Do not let sewage or other wastes flow into a stormwater system.

Clean up after your pet

- All municipalities and public agencies must enact and enforce local pet-waste rules.
- An example is requiring pet owners or their keepers to pick up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or private property.
- Make sure you know your town’s or agency’s requirements and comply with them. It’s the law. And remember to:



- o Use newspaper, bags or pooper scoopers to pick up wastes
- o Dispose of the wrapped pet waste in the trash or unwrapped in a toilet.
- o Never discard pet waste in a storm drain

Don’t feed wildlife

- Do not feed wildlife, such as ducks and geese, in public areas.
- All municipalities and public agencies must enact and enforce a rule the prohibits wildlife feeding in these areas.



Don’t Litter

- Place litter in trash receptacles.
- Recycle. Recycle. Recycle
- Participate in community cleanups.

Dispose of yard waste properly

- Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains
- If your municipality or agency has yard waste collection rules, follow them
- Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost
- Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn

Solutions to Stormwater Pollution

Easy Things You Can Do Every Day to Protect Our Water

A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water

Pollution on the streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking water supplies and the ocean and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, pet waste, grass clippings: You name it and it ends up in our water.

Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we're all doing something about it.

By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater. It all adds up to cleaner water, and it saves the high cost of cleaning up once it's dirty.



As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, many municipalities and other public agencies including colleges and military bases must adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines or other penalties.

As a resident, business, or other member of the New Jersey community, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day to protect our water.

Limit your use of fertilizers and pesticides



- Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer
- Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is predicted
- Look into alternatives for pesticides
- Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your property or yard in a natural state with trees and other native vegetation that requires little or no fertilizer
- If you use fertilizers and pesticides, follow the instructions on the label on how to correctly apply it.
- Make sure you properly store or discard any unused portions

Properly use and dispose of hazardous products

- Hazardous products include some household or commercial cleaning products, lawn and garden care products, motor oil, antifreeze, and paints.
- Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local waterbodies and the water is not treated.
- If you have hazardous products in your home or workplace, make sure you store or dispose of them properly. Read the label for guidance.
- Use natural or less toxic alternatives when possible.
- Recycle used motor oil
- Contact your municipality, county or facility management office for the locations of hazardous-waste disposal facilities.

FANWOOD-SCOTCH PLAINS RECYCLING ASSOCIATION RULES FOR RECYCLING

The following materials will be accepted at the Fanwood Recycling Center on North Avenue:

ALUMINUM – The recycling center will accept all Aluminum products. Pull tabs, seamless, rounded bottom cans formed in one piece tend to be made of aluminum. The center will also accept clean frozen food trays, pie tins, aluminum foil.,
NOTE: Heavy aluminum items may NOT be co-mingled with light aluminum cans and must be placed in the designated Heavy Metal area.

APPLIANCES & SCRAP METAL – Small appliances, hardware, wire hangers, pots, pans, doors, window frames (without glass) gutters and down spouts are welcome. Larger items such as refrigerators, washers, dryers, hot water heaters, air conditioning units and microwaves are also accepted at the center.
NOTE: A donation is requested for these items

BATTERIES – Vehicle & button batteries only are accepted. See Page 12 for battery disposal details.

CDs/DVDs- Accepted at the kiosk near the exit.

CLOTHING AND TEXTILES – Clean clothing, curtains, towels, sheets, hats, belts, paired socks and shoes tied together. NOTE: Wet material and pillows, rugs, plastic foam-backed drapes are not accepted.

CORRUGATED CARDBOARD – Boxes should be cut and flattened. Paper bags and plain cardboard food packaging fall into this category

COMPUTER INKJETS, LASER AND TONER CARTRIDGES – Original boxes are appreciated. Please hand these items to a staffer.

ELECTRONICS – Televisions, computer towers, monitors, VCR's, Stereo equipment, laptops, printers, copy machines etc.
NOTE: A donation is requested for these items.

GLASS – Rinse and separate glass into clear/near clear; brown; and green/other. Paper labels may remain, but all metal caps and rings, plastic, lead or metal sleeves are to be removed
NOTE: Plate glass and light bulbs are NOT accepted (see fluorescent light bulbs below).

LIGHT-BULBS – Fluorescent light bulbs (unbroken), Compact fluorescent lights (CFL's)
Standard incandescent bulbs are not recyclable.

METAL CANS – Must be rinsed thoroughly.

MIXED PAPER/BOOKS – Telephone books, office paper, computer paper, junk mail, magazines, brochures, catalogs may be brought in paper shopping bags – no plastic bags. Hard- and soft-cover books, including encyclopedias, textbooks.

NEWSPAPER – Tie with string/twine in bundles no higher than 10".

OIL – Residents must pour into the waste oil tank at the center. Do not leave your containers.
NOTE: Antifreeze is NOT accepted.

OLD AMERICAN FLAGS – These will be recycled respectfully by the American Legion. Please hand these items to a staffer.

PAINT CANS – Water base (latex) paint only...paint must be fully absorbed with either cat litter or shredded paper, emptied and completely dried out leave lid off. Oil based paint is considered Hazardous Waste – for proper disposal see "Household Hazardous Waste Events" on Page 10

PLASTICS – Only plastic with the recycling triangle numbers 1, 2 or 3 will be accepted at the Plastics Sorting Bin. Plastic chairs/tables, toys, buckets (donation requested) are collected at the Rigid Plastics dumpster; NOTE: 4, 5, 6 & 7 plastics are not acceptable for disposal at this center

WHITE STYROFOAM - Clean block pieces, such as used for packaging appliances. Foam peanuts and food containers cannot be accepted.

RESIDENTIAL GUIDELINES FOR PUBLIC WORKS SERVICES

SNOW REMOVAL GUIDELINES

Snow must be shoveled from sidewalks within 12 hours of daylight after the snow has fallen. Vehicles should be removed from the streets during snow storms to allow the Department to effectively plow the streets. Residents who live on a dead end street or cul-de-sac should not park in the street or we will be unable to plow. Shovel your driveway by the street to the right. The plows will then carry the snow away from your driveway and not into it. Do not shovel or blow snow into the center of the road as this will freeze and create unsafe ice conditions. It is recommended not to shovel the last 10 feet of your driveway until the storm is finished *and* **Public Works has plowed your street from curb to curb.**

Basketball hoops (portable or stationary) are NOT permitted within the Borough right-of-way per ordinance 259-25.C. These items prohibit Public Works from effectively plowing the streets curb to curb. In addition, these units obstruct access to the brush and leaf piles during the annual pickup program(s).

SANITARY SEWER

The Borough operates the sanitary system. The Borough is only responsible for the maintenance of the main sewer line. The lateral service connection (between the home and the main sewer line in the street) is the responsibility of the resident. If a backup occurs in your home please call the Department of Public Works during the day, Monday thru Friday at 322-7404 or after hours please contact the Fanwood Police Department at 322-5000. Please contact us first so we can determine where the problem exists to avoid any unnecessary plumbing costs to you.

All materials must be curbside by 7 AM on Monday of the week designated for your quadrant, but no earlier than three (3) days prior to the designated collection date.

8.5 x 11 Placard to be displayed in window, visible from the street.

The following items are NOT acceptable and will be left for removal by resident by the end of the collection day:

- Recyclable Materials listed in DPW Schedule (Page 5)
- Building or Construction Materials
- Natural Growth items (leaves, firewood, branches, clippings)
- Hazardous Waste (Paints, solvents, thinners, petroleum products, batteries, televisions, computer equipment/monitors, etc.)
- Flammable Explosive Waste
- Moto Vehicle Components
- Regular Household Garbage

Note: bulk items placed in boxes will be picked up. However, it is the residents responsibility to recycle the emptied boxes left behind by Public Works. any other items that can be brought to the Recycling Center will not be picked up during Bulk Waste pick-up dates. (See Annual Schedule (Pg. 5) for list of recyclable items).

RODENT PREVENTION MEASURES FACT SHEET

The following measures can help you avoid rodent problems:

1. Clean your yard and driveway of all debris cut high grass and weeds. Eliminate possible rat harborage areas under porches, outside staircases and around shed foundations by using fencing or blocking openings where possible. Note a rat burrow is a hole approximately the size of a baseball.
2. Place all garbage in metal or plastic containers with tight-fitting lids. Use adequate sized garbage containers to prevent overloading and spillage.
3. Pile all wood or other material stored outside into closely packed units at least six (6) inches off the ground.
4. Bird feeders should be placed at least four feet from the ground and be constructed to eliminate spillage to the ground. Throwing pieces of bread, crackers, and food scraps directly on to the ground encourages rats to harbor on your property.
5. Gardens should be fenced with small meshed wire and maintained on a regular basis. Remove any fruit that has fallen from trees on a daily basis.
6. Animal feces must be cleaned up on a regular basis.
